They will decorate their own flying butterfly and learn how butterflies migrate to Mexico. In the process, they will get a closer look at butterfly parts. # The Outdoor Classroom

Outdoor play is a necessity in the daily routine of young children. The outdoor environment is filled with unexpected investigations and learning opportunities, and plenty of general knowledge happens naturally. Outdoors, children can learn many developmental skills, such as risk-taking, physical development, logic and science. Try these 6 ideas to take your child's learning outside:

- Visit a local lumberyard or construction site and ask for leftover wood. Invite your child to help you sand the blocks. Keep them outside for building and playing.
- Find plastic crates, pieces of lumber, heavy-duty cardboard boxes, old shower curtains and sheets or material to create play houses, tents and other structures.

  Your child can make weather-durable forts outside.

• Create a small garden area that can be completely tended with your child, from planting to weeding and harvesting.

Use large totes, old children's pools or an unused sandbox.

 Have a box of clipboards, pencils, magnifying glasses and other tools ready to bring outside that encourage observation, exploration and discovery.

• Explore naturally created challenges together that might seem unsafe for the child to explore alone, e.g., a clump of bushes, stumps, fallen logs and trees with low branches.

• Don't let weather keep you from playing outside. Put on rain gear, cold-weather gear or other items that allow you to experience nature together, no matter the weather.
